Hot Potatoes

Overview

Hot Potatoes is a fun and interactive way to review the text in a reading, read and answer comprehension questions and practice vocabulary. It helps you understand how sentences and paragraphs are connected. These activities can be attempted multiple times.

1. Click on a Hot Potatoes activity link.



2. Read the instructions, and choose the first segment of the sentence (in this case, either A or B). Some answers are numbered to show they are the beginning of a new paragraph.



Reconstruct the sentences and paragraphs piece by piece by clicking on the next part of each sentence or paragraph. Continue until the text is completed.

Once complete, your score will show and you will see an *Activity completion* checkmark on your course.

3. Click the OK button to return to the unit page.



At any point, the *Restart* button allows you to repeat the activity.

The Show only the last part of the text button is helpful when there is a longer text, and users choose not to scroll up and down the whole text. For shorter passages, clicking or not clicking this button will not show any differences.




