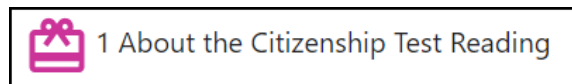
SCORM activities are identified by this icon. 

SCORM activities are types of quizzes.

There are different SCORM activities, and they function differently. It is important to read the instructions when you have a different type of SCORM activity so that you understand what you must do.

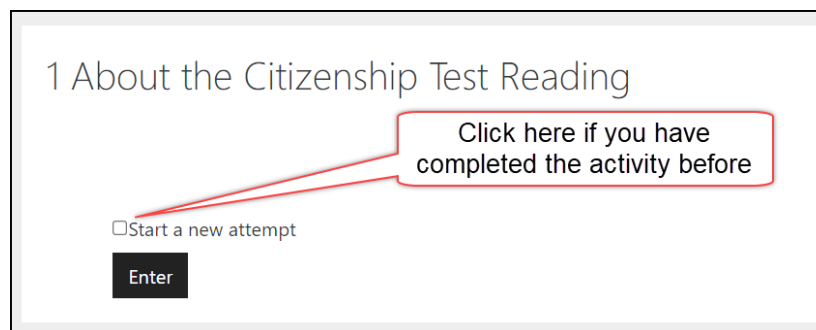
SCORM Reading Activity (Sample from Citizenship Unit)

1. On the course page, click on a SCORM link.



A pop-up window appears.

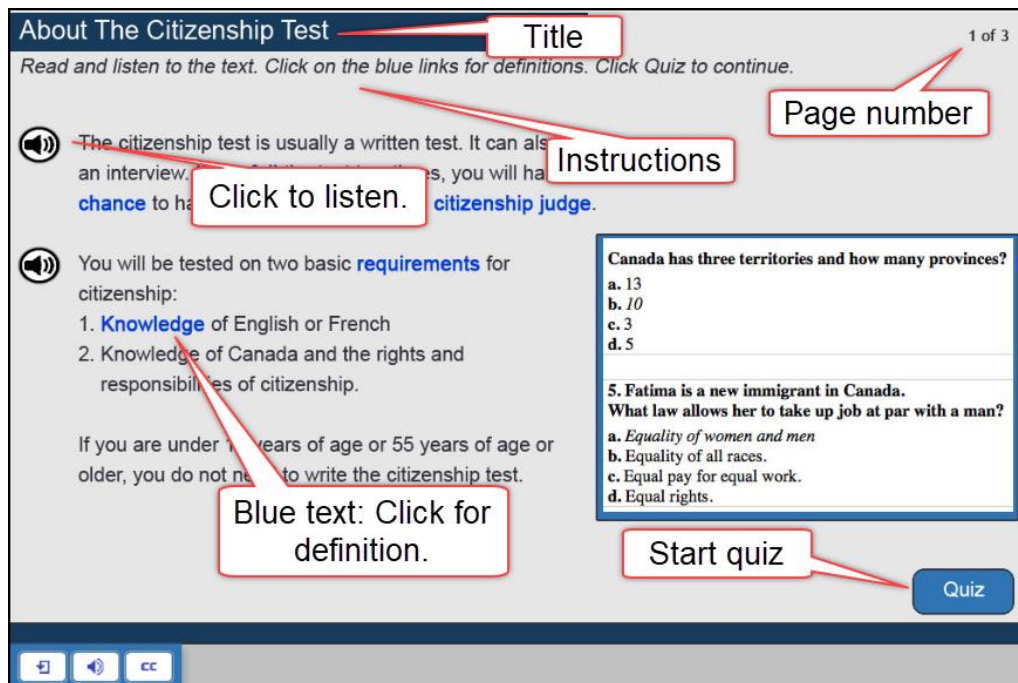
2. If you have not attempted the activity before, click on the *Enter* button.
3. If you have completed the activity before, but wish to do it again for more practice, click the box next to *Start a new attempt*. This will start the activity from the first slide. If you do not check this box, you will see the activity from where you left off the previous attempt.



4. When you click *Enter*, the title screen of the SCORM activity appears.



5. Once loaded, the activity appears (in this case, a reading).



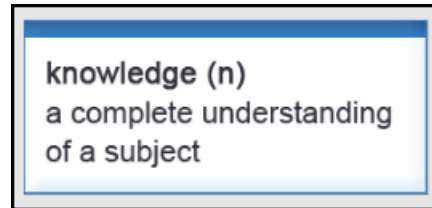
The title of the activity is at the top of the screen, e.g. "About the Citizenship Test"

The activity instructions are under the title.

On the right side, you can see how many pages are in the activity. (There are 3 in this activity.)

6. To listen to the reading, click on the speaker icon.

7. To the right of the sound icon is the reading text. Text appearing in blue are links to definitions.
8. Click on the blue word, “knowledge,” and a definition pop up appears.

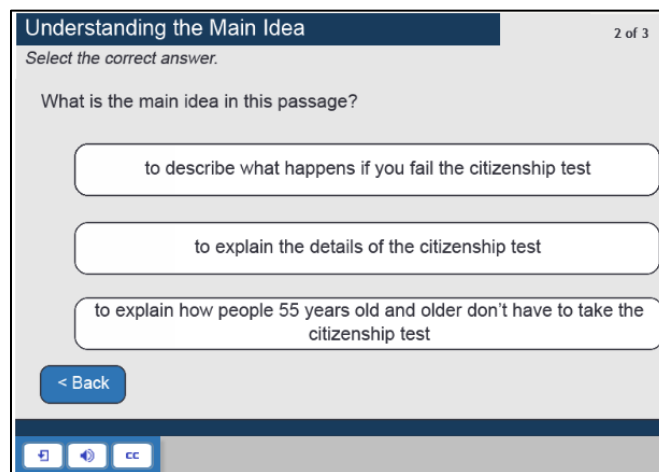


9. After you read all of the text, click on the *Quiz* button to take the quiz.

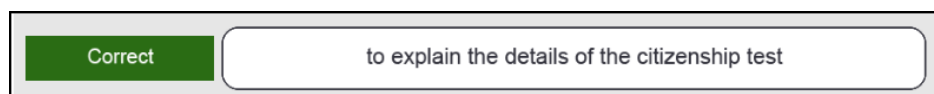
Different question types can appear. They can be *multiple-choice*, *true-false* or *drag and drop*.

Multiple Choice (Sample from Citizenship Unit)

1. With *multiple-choice* questions, click on the best answer.



If your answer is right, the word *Correct* appears on the screen.



If your choice is incorrect, the words *Try Again* appear on the screen.

Click on another choice until you get the correct answer.

2. Click on the *Next*> button to continue.

Drag & Drop Words

1. With *drag and drop* questions, drag the word to match the meaning.

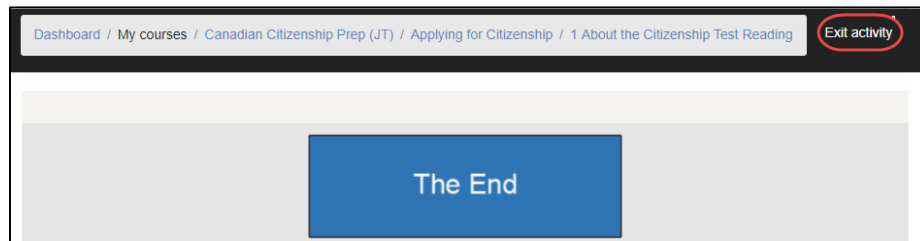

3. At the end of an activity, make sure to click on the *Exit activity* button to save your score. Then use the *Breadcrumb menu* to go back to your course.



Some *SCORM* activities might look different. In these activities, all the elements are shown on the same page.

The reading passage is to the left, and the questions are on the right side of the page. You can answer the questions one at a time, by choosing the best answer for each and clicking on the small arrow button to see the next question.
