

## H5P Activities

### Overview

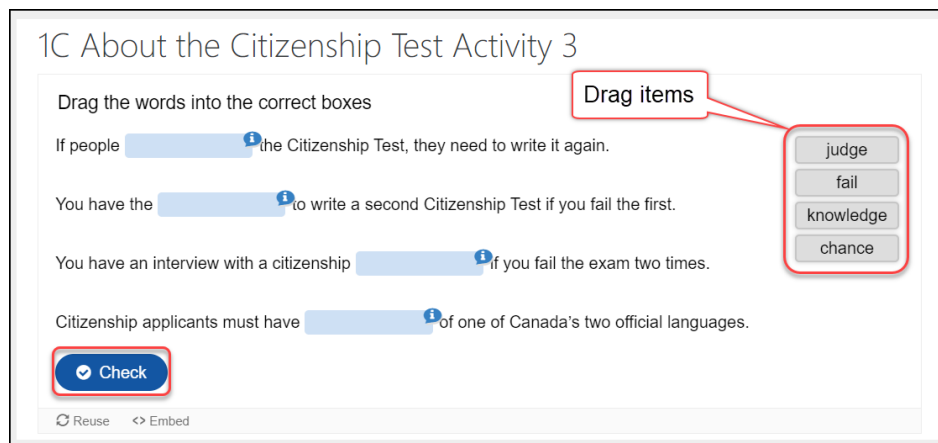
H5P activities are used throughout your courses. These activities allow you to learn and check your understanding with videos, listening exercises and different kinds of quizzes. You can learn at your own speed using navigation controls. Quiz feedback is immediate. Results of your interaction with an H5P activity are shown on a summary screen.

### H5P Drag the Words

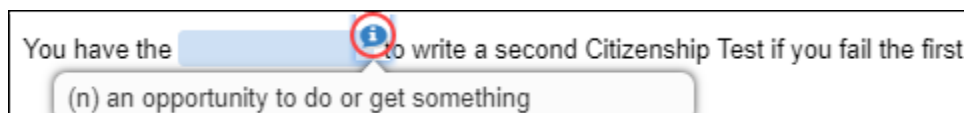
1. On the course page, click the H5P activity link.



2. The H5P activity appears. This example is a *Drag the words* activity.



3. Read the sentences and drag the missing words from the right side into the blanks.
4. Each blank has an *Information* icon. Click on this icon to see a clue.



5. After all of the words have been moved into the blanks, click on the *Check* button.

The correct answers will appear in green.

You have an interview with a citizenship judge ✓ if you fail the exam two times.

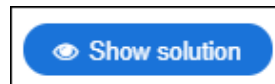
The incorrect answers will appear in red.

If people chance ✗ the Citizenship Test, they need to write it again.

6. Click on the *Retry* button to try again.



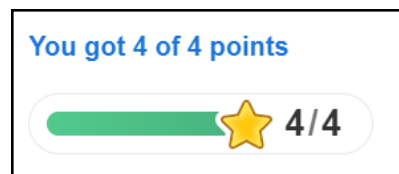
7. If you still have “red” (incorrect) answers, you can click on the *Show solution* button to see the correct answers.



The correct answer will appear in green after the blank.

If people chance ✗ fail ✓ the Citizenship Test, they need to write it again.

8. If you see only green images on the screen, you have completed the activity. A green progress indicator and a star will show your score.



## H5P Combination Activity

1. On the course page, click the *H5P* activity link.



The *H5P* activity appears. There is a title page of a combination activity.

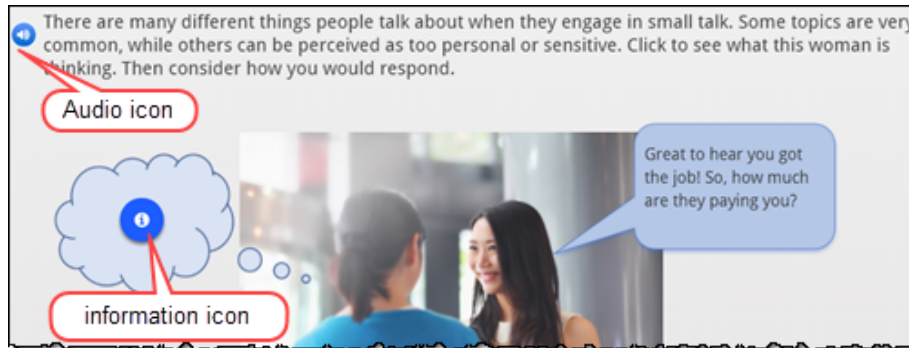
2. To start, click on the second block in the *navigation bar* at the bottom of the page.

Note: You may need to scroll down to see the *navigation bar*.

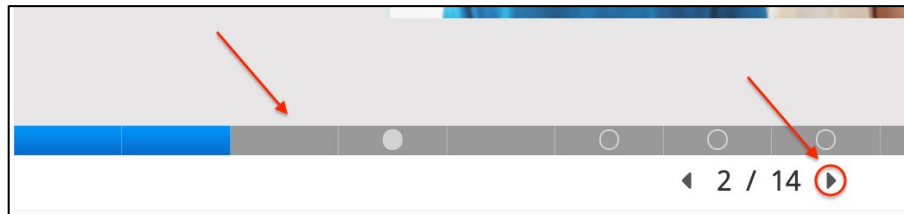


A listening activity appears and the instructions are read aloud. You can listen to the instructions again by clicking on the *Audio* icon.

3. The *Information* icon shows missing information on the slide when clicked. In this case, the *Information* icon displays the thoughts of the person. Click the “x” in the new window to close it.



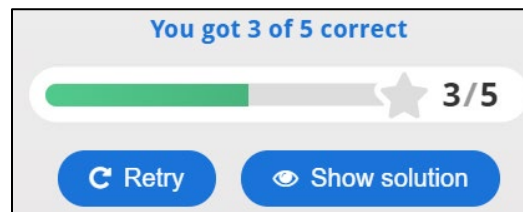
- To move to the next slide, click the next block in the *navigation bar*, or click the arrow beside the slide number indicator.



- Some slides include *multiple-choice* questions. The instructions in these slides tell you how many questions you need to answer. Note that you can only view one question at a time. After you choose an answer, the next question appears.
- To see how many questions you have answered, move the mouse over the bar at the bottom of the screen.



- At the end of an activity, you can see how many questions you answered correctly.



- Clicking on the *Retry* button restarts the quiz on that slide.

9. Clicking on the *Show solution* button gives you the answers.

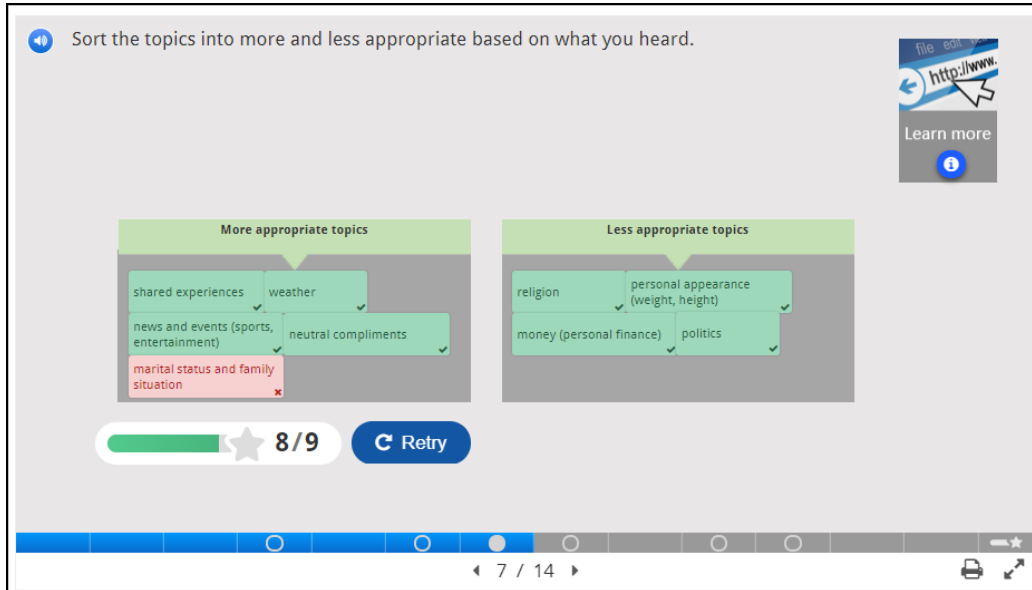
